## The Parliament Review recognises Kirton Primary School as a 'Best Practice Representative' of primary education in the UK

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Kirton Primary School's success in improving educational standards for its children has been featured in a publication read by politicians and business leaders.

The school's "Learn and Earn" project, which has helped pupils progress in reading, writing and maths, has been recognised in the 2019-20 Parliamentary Review for primary education in the Midlands.

Kirton, part of the appropriately named Parliament Federation along with two nursery schools in Kirton and Boston respectively, is one of just 11 schools in the region to be featured as a "Best Practice Representative."

The feature comes after a school year in which Kirton was shortlisted for six awards, with the school winning the STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) category at the 2019 Education Business Awards in July.

Also last term, Zoe West was named Most Inspirational Primary School Teacher at the Lincolnshire Free Press and Spalding Guardian Education Awards in July.

Executive head teacher Nicky Donley said: "It was a huge honour, and an even bigger surprise, when the school was approached to be featured in this year's edition of the Parliamentary Review.

"It has always been felt that this was a publication for prestigious schools in distant towns and cities, not one that would feature a village school in rural Lincolnshire.

"Our staff and governors are incredibly proud to have been recognised for their dedication to their local community in the national arena once again."

The feature focused on Kirton "pursuing teaching beyond the core curriculum" which has to educational standards increasing "dramatically", putting it in the top two per cent of primary schools in England.
