









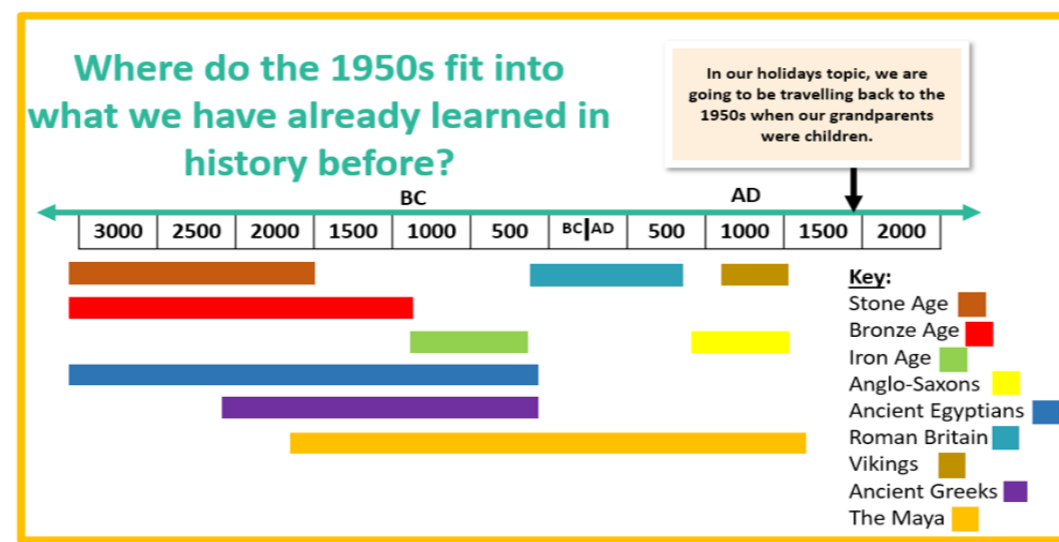

	<p>In 1955, camping became very popular as a cheap way to spend a holiday.</p> <p>Holiday camps like Butlins and Pontins were very popular in the 1960s.</p>	In Reception, you learnt which clothes to take in a suitcase for a camping trip.			<p>Souvenirs are objects that are collected or bought on holiday to help remember the experiences and emotions of the holiday.</p> <p>Popular souvenirs are fridge magnets, mugs or T-shirts that often have the name of the place on them.</p> <p>At the beginning of Year 2, you learnt that people bought Grace Darling souvenir mugs to celebrate her rescuing sailors from a storm.</p>
	<p>By 1965, people began to go on holiday abroad.</p> <p>Skiing holidays became popular from the 1960s.</p>	In Year 1, you learnt about the first aeroplane flight that could take people to other countries.			<p>A traditional souvenir from Skegness is a sweet known as 'rock'.</p> <p>The rock often has the name of the place written on it.</p> <p>Earlier in Year 2, you learnt that traditional foods are food recipes that have been passed on for many years.</p>
