

Communication and Language		
Developing conversation, often jumping from topic to topic.	Engage in pretend play: 'putting baby to sleep' or 'driving the car to the shops'.	Listen to stories and understand what is happening with the help of pictures.
Identify familiar objects and properties when they are described: for example: 'blue car', 'shiny apple'.	Understand and act on longer sentences like 'make teddy jump' or 'find your coat'.	Understand simple questions about 'who', 'what' and 'where'.
Personal, Social and Emotional	Development	
Play with increasing confidence on their own and with other children, knowing that a familiar adult is nearby.	Feel confident when taken out around the local neighbourhood, and enjoy exploring new places.	Grow in independence, rejecting help ("me do it")
Begin to show 'effortful control'. For example, waiting for a turn and resisting the impulse to grab what they want or get to the front.	Notice and ask questions about differences such as skin colour, types of hair, gender, special needs and disabilities.	Talk about their feelings in more elaborated ways: "I'm sad because" or "I love it when"
Physical Development		
Clap and stamp to music.	Enjoy starting to kick, throw and catch balls.	Build independently with a range of appropriate resources
Walk, run, jump and climb — and start to use the stairs independently.	Sit on a push-along wheeled toy, use a scooter or ride a tricycle.	Explore different materials and tools: such as paint, playdough, spoons and shells.
Use large and small motor skills to do things independently, for example manage buttons and zips, and pour drinks.	Show an increasing desire to be independent, such as wanting to feed themselves and dress and undress.	Learn to use the toilet with help, and then independently.
